Guidelines for Summarizing Your 4-H Accomplishments

When you submit your Honor Club application, it goes through two rounds of review.

Round 1: The Honor Club Screening Committee reviews your **entire** application.

- Your application is evaluated against a standard rubric.
- All applicants that pass the initial screening are then recommended for membership!

Round 2: At Honor Club Conference, all members in attendance review your Application Summary, which consists of:

- Your application point totals
- Your 4-H statement
- Your summary of 4-H accomplishments

Because your **Summary of 4-H Accomplishments** is one of the main ways Honor Club members review your application for membership, it's a critical piece of your application! Learning to write good summaries of your accomplishments is a valuable skill. Similar to the way that you would highlight your most notable achievements in a resume for a prospective employer, think of your Summary of 4-H Accomplishments as a way to communicate your accomplishments in a concise way.

In the space below, high light a SUMMARY of your 4-H Accomplishments. Please try to include the most important achievements from each section of this application and limit your summary by highlighting your accomplishments in each area.

4-HINVOLVEMENT and PARTICIPATION

You can use the Honor Club Application Rubric to guide you in writing your summaries. Here are some general guidelines to consider:

- Use a consistent structure throughout your summaries.
 - For example, you can type out a short paragraph in full sentences, or you can
 write out a comma-separated list. Whichever you choose, use the same structure
 for all of your summaries.
- Summaries shouldn't list new activities; instead, they should summarize what you listed in the corresponding section of your application.
- Include details whenever possible, such as years participated, number of people impacted, number of hours volunteered, or amount of money raised.
- Spell-check your summaries.
- Limit your summaries to the space provided.

We've also included some examples of good summaries that communicate 4-H accomplishments effectively! These were adapted from 4-H members who were inducted into Honor Club in previous years.

Example 1: 4-H Involvement and Participation

What makes this a good summary?

- Overall 4-H Involvement includes the number of times events were attended.
- Recognition and Awards includes award placement or name of the award when appropriate.
- Non 4-H activities include length of involvement.

Example 2: Community Service

What makes this a good summary?

- Community service projects highlight the number of hours and/or impact made.
- Organized Community Service Project category highlights the role and length of involvement.
- Fundraising includes dollar amounts or quantity of items sold when possible.

Example 3: Communication/Marketing

What makes this a good summary?

- Presentation categories or topics are clear, as well as the level and years participated.
- Using abbreviations for local, county, district, and state is totally fine!
- Descriptions clearly describe the activities and years of involvement.

Example 4: Civic Engagement

4-H Promotion	Campaign manager for Clover County 4-H WHEP Club Vice President, 2022; campaigned for Clover County 4-H Teen Council (elected), 2023; voting delegate for Clover County in State Officer elections, 2023	

What makes this a good summary?

- Descriptions clearly describe the activities and years of participation.
- Roles and corresponding offices are described for different campaigns in the 4-H promotion category.

Example 5: Leadership

What makes this a good summary?

- Names of offices and committees are clear and include years of service.
- Leadership experiences are clearly described.
- Teaching and facilitating activities include the number of people taught or number of events facilitated.
- Non 4-H leadership experiences are described clearly.
